Modern British art of the more advanced type has no advocate more helpful and enthusiastic than Miss Dorothy Warren, who, having successfully launched her gallery in Maddox-street, is now in Berlin bent upon overcoming Continental prejudice against modern British art.

Berlin art circles in particular were inclined to dismiss contemporary British effort with contempt, and even to deny the exist-ence of any British contribution to the

modern movement.

But all this is now changed, thanks to Miss Warren's enterprise in arranging an exhibition of our young painters' work in Berlin. Evan Walters, the young miner-artist, to whose brilliant promise The Daily Mail first drew attention, has taken Berlin by storm. Henry Moore, Adrian Daintrey, and Allan Walton find many admirers, and quite a number of their works have already been sold to ber of their works have already been sold to German collectors, although the exhibition has only been open a few days.
